President's Report ...

Gripe Night Set

The February meeting of the Pimmit Hills Citizens Association will be held on Tuesday, February 6, in the Pimmit Hills School at 8 p.m.

The February meeting will be devoted almost exclusively to a 'Gripe' session. The purpose of this meeting is to provide an opportunity to all of the residents of Pimmit Hills -- members as well as non-members of the Association - - to not only give us their complaints but their suggestions as well, on what the Association should accomplish.

As most of the residents know, the Association conducted an extensive membership drive during the month of January. At the time of writing this article, the response to the drive was much greater than anticipated.

Without exaggeration, 75 to 80% of the homes contacted have become members of the Association and we have every expectation of contacting 90% of the 1700 homes in the area. Numerically this means that by February 6th we hope to have a minimum of one thousand one hundred paid up members.

Of course this could not have been accomplished without the unselfish

devotion of Co-Chairmen Earl Powell and Joe Griffith and the 60 some odd persons who went from door to door, as well as the co-operation of everyone who so willingly purchased memberships.

Obviously our Association will be the largest active Association in Fairfax County, Moreover, we will have more money in our treasury than ever before. Just so the record is straight. I propose to SPEND A SUB-STANTIAL part of this money during the next four months. How it is spent, in what amounts, and for what will be determined by the members -present and voting -- at the regular monthly meetings. Of course there are many important projects that should be accomplished -- some of which are unknown to the Executive Committee. It is for this reason that we want to hear your suggestions at the February meeting. Come forward now or forever hold your peace.

Also at this meeting we will present brief reports on the results of the membership drive; the public hearing before the Planning Commission on the proposed apartments on Magarity Road; and the dance to be held in March.

WANTED

Representation Based on Population Rather than on Geographical Area

Mr. Edward Lynch and Mr. Omer Hirst, two former delegates to the State legislature, discussed reapportionment. Mr. Hirst, a member of the Governor's Commission on Reapportionment, reported that if the State legislature accepts the recommendations of the Commission (there is considerable opposition, but there is some chance that the recommendation may be approved), the number of

state senators from Northern Virginia may go from 3 to 5, and the number of delegates from 6 to 9, thus almost doubling our representation.

Mr. Lynch, while not hostile to Hirst, expressed his disapproval of the recommendation because he wants representation based on proportion (i.e. population) rather than on geographical area.

The report on the Governor's Commission on Reapportionment is available by writing to the Dept. of Purchase and Supply, Richmond, Virginia.

Due to small attendance, motions on reapportionment and on City Charter were postponed to the January meeting.

BOOK FAIR PLANNED AT LEWINSVILLE

The Lewinsville PTA held its third regular meeting January 15, 1962 in the school cafeteria. The fifth grade sponsored a very successful bake sale in the lobby before and after the meeting. The sale was particularly enjoyed by the unusual number of children present at the meeting due to the Square Dance demonstration presented by Miss Agnew's sixth grade and part of the fifth grade. Miss Agnew is well known for her dance arrangements, and the children's performance did her credit.

The PTA agreed to hold a Book Fair at the next general meeting on March 19. The proceeds of the sale will finance the purchase of books for the school library, which at present contains only the bare mini-

mum of books allocated a new school by the County of Fairfax. Books ordered during the Fair will be on hand in time for Easter giving.

The guest speaker for the evening was Miss Evelyn Bull. Director of Supervision and Instruction in the District schools. She spoke on the "Amidon" Plan, which is a new approach to education in the elementary schools at present being developed in the District. This method of teaching emphasizes, among other things, reading and spelling through phonics, and also the 'new' math. A similar system of arithmetic is already being taught at Lewinsville through all the grades. Miss Bull said she believed it would be several years before the results of the plan could be adequately evaluated.

FEDERATION REPORT January Meeting

The Federation passed a motion on Reapportionment, commending the Governor's Commission and urging the legislature to enact reapportionment legislation promptly, but urging that the representation at the House of Delegates is still too small and should be raised from 5 to 9 instead of from 5 to 7, as recommended by the commission. The motion also requested a vote by population so that each voter should vote for one member only.

A resolution was also passed requesting the Legislature to approve a City Charter for the County of Fairfax.

Resolutions on Site Plan Procedures and Industrial Zoning in Advance were postponed until the February meeting.

Warren Quenstedt, Deputy Director of the National Capital Transportation Agency, described the mass transportation system plan being worked out by this agency.

ST. LUKE'S PROPOSED EXPANSION PROGRAM

Above is an artist's conception of the proposed educational building, which will be addition A to the present building of St. Luke's Methodist Church. This building will contain 12 classrooms, storage areas for supplies, additional toilet and sanitary facilities, office space, and a small chapel, for an estimated 12,000 square feet of additional space.

Construction on the addition will begin when there is approximately \$30,000.00 cash on hand. Thus, the tual date of groundbreaking will pend on how well and when money is received towards the subscriptions to the building program. However, it is anticipated that groundbreaking will take place in approximately 2½ to 3 years from the present time. It will take about 6 months from date of groundbreaking to complete construction on the addition.

Some of our members and friends wonder why or if this building is necessary. The present building was designed to accommodate a maximum of 270 in Sunday School. Attendance at Sunday School has grown from 207 in 1958 to more than 300 in 1961. The parish population shows a steady

growth trend: 7,620 in 1955: 9,175 in 1960; and an estimated population of 12,170 by 1980. Statistics show that about 12% are potential members of St. Luke's. This figure will be far greater if the proposed plan to construct new apartments in the area materializes. The parish, for the most part, is made up of young married couples with small children, a trend which is expected to continue in the future. Extensive growth in Sunday School attendance can thus be anticipated. Also needed are high school classes, adult Sunday School classes, and a crawler's nursery. Some existing classes are too large and need to be divided. A room should be set aside exclusively for youth recreational activities, scouting, handicrafts and hobbies. All of this cannot be accomplished without additional space.

The cost of the new building is estimated at around \$134,000.00, which includes the architect's fee.

Addition B to the present building will be a permanent, air-conditioned sanctuary seating 350 persons, which is expected to be erected around 1975

ST. LUKE'S CHURCH OFFERS PRE-SCHOOL TRAINING

St. Luke's weekday kindergarten is sponsored by the St. Luke's Methodist Church, 2300 Leesburg Pike. The school is held in two rooms which are rented from the church. Religious teaching is not part of the curriculum.

St. Luke's Kindergarten offers a curriculum designed to prepare preschool children with a challenging supplementary program of learning to provide readiness for school without an overlapping field of learning.

Some of the aims of the kindergarten are to teach children to:

- (a) face problems in a constructive way.
- (b) get along well with other children.
- (c) take part in games.
- (d) be courteous and mannerly.
- (e) assume responsibility.
- (f) do handwork (paint, cut, paste, coloring, etc.)
- (g) recite before a group.
- (h) rest quietly when directed to do so.
- (i) express ideas.
- (j) put on and take off wraps.
- (k) have an interest and enjoy books. There are a great many more aims that could be listed. Every child may not be able to do all of the above things, however, it is hoped that the majority of children will accomplish most of them.

The year of kindergarten in a child's life is very important in laying a foundation for public school. More andmore public schools are recognizing the needs for kindergartens.

You may enroll your child for the 1962-63 session on February 21 at St. Luke's Methodist Church, 2300 Leesburg Pike, from 7:30 to 9:00 p.m.

Children of any faith may be enrolled.

The registration fee is fifteen dollars (\$15); which includes expenses for supplies, equipment and insurance. The tuition fee is seve teen dollars and fifty cents (\$17.5) per pupil per month.

The school does not furnish transportation, so parents must form their own car pools.

Those wishing to enroll their child in the kindergarten for the remaining months of this school year, can do so by calling TW 3-8460.

January has been a very busy month for the children in the kindergarten. A visit from Officer Floyd Bedell, of the Arlington Police Force, was a thrill for each of them. A trip to the firehouse in McLean was another highlight. Group pictures were made of the children; these pictures will be made available to the parents at a small fee.

On January 10, Mrs. Lewis, the teacher, and four parents braved the snow and ice to attend the Arlington Pre-school Association meeting at Seven Corners. The speaker, Dr. Hyrum Smith, Specialist in Child Guidance of the U. S. Office of Edication, Washington D. C., gave some very worthwhile advice of the preschool child.

February looks as if it will be another month of busy activity. A trip to the post office and a Valentine party are scheduled.

'UNIVERSAL EDUCATION' THEME FOR PTA FLOAT

Plans were unveiled for Fairfax County to be represented in the 1962 Cherry Blossom Festival Parade at the egular January meeting of the Pimit Hills PTA.

A 48 foot float featuring an actual waterfall, rock garden, and spraying pools is planned with the theme entitled UNIVERSAL EDUCATION.

Near the waterfall 14 children in native costumes will represent various countries with flags from 30 nations.

Pimmit Hills PTA approved the plan in the presence of Mr. Bun Bray, President of the Fairfax County Council of PTA's who was guest for the evening.

PTA President, Mr. Douglas Glass, was authorized to present the entire plan to the County Council when it meets January 23, 1962, in the Annandale Elementary School.

This is the second consecutive year the Pimmit Hills PTA is handling such a project for County-wide representation.

According to actual records kept on the man-hours donated last year, r unbelievable 618 hours were volliteered by Pimmit Hills' workers in the building of the float.

Another important action taken at the meeting was the authorization of a new television set to be used in the primary wing. This brings the number of sets now on hand in the school to a total of 10. All fourth, fifth and sixth grades are fully equipped, and this set will be portable to facilitate use in any primary class.

Movies will be shown Friday afternoons in the school cafeteria, on a trial basis. If parents so desire, children will be permitted to go home and then return. The movies will be handled by volunteers from the ranks of room mothers.

It is hoped that arrangements can be made so that one room mother will have to give no more than one afternoon to this entire project. This hope can become a reality, depending upon the room mothers themselves. If all do their equal share, no one group or chosen few will have to carry the load for the others.

The February meeting is the annual Founders' Day meeting, and a special program for the entire family is planned. This is the observance of the actual founding of Parent-Teachers activity and a meeting not to miss.

Remember, any school which educates our children today, and is represented by a PTA unit, is in effect your PTA, and the workings and progress of the organization are nothing more than the reflection of your interest. What is your status, member or non-member?
