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## SCHOOL SITE IMPROVEMENTS PLANNED

Since the school bond issue has been passed, the school board hopes to use funds in this area over the next four school years for site improvement at the following lementary schools: Lemon Road, \$9,800, Pimmit Hills, $\$ 6,000$ and Dunn Loring, $\$ 16,500$. This includes grading and draining the play areas, sodding where needed and bringing parking areas and black-top play areas up to County-wide standards. Also, a new senior high school is being planned for the Tyson's Corner area. It will consist of about forty-five acres and will have a 1,600 student capacity, which will eventually be enlarged to accomodate 2,000 students. However, the site has not yet been purchased.
