MRS. IRMINGARD SMITH HOME FROM HOSPITAL by Kathie Ritchey

Many of us are saddened by the tragedy in the life of Mrs. Irmingard Smith. Possibly, the adults may not know who Mrs. Smith is, but many of our children do & She was the driver of one of the yellow Fairfax County School busses for many, many years. Bussing Pimmit Hills children to Dunn Loring School, and later to Lemon Rd. School and McLean High. Also making many field trips with the children and room mothers.

Her love and interest in our children went "above and beyond" what was expected of a bus driver. Mrs. Smith was seriously injured in an auto accident on the Washington-Baltimore Pike, New Year's Day, in which her husband was killed, and her children (all adopted) were injured. She, herself, owes her own life to the quick thinking of her son, Charles, who gave her first aid.

Mrs. Smith was known for her deep concern for the welfare of her young passengers. We mothers all felt that our children were as safe as possible when Mrs. Smith was at the wheel. She even made special stops for crippled children on occasion.

I recall, about 5 years ago, my son was seriously injured and went to school on crutches. Physical therapy was needed urgently each evening after school. So, Mrs. Smith brought him home on the first run (instead of the usual 2nd run) stopping in front of our house and guiding him safely across the street.

I shall always be grateful to her for that act of kindness. Now, Mrs. Smith has many months of suffering ahead of her. However, she is not forgotten by many among us.

The Lemon Road school has taken up a collection for her, the Pimmit Hills Teen Club (of which she and her husband were regular chaperons) held a benefit dance for her, and James Madison and McLean High were trying to get blood donated for her. We can be proud of the love, generosity and appreciation of the young folks of our community. The bus drivers of Fairfax County have given her a nice donation, and what with Judy getting another operation, it was a blessing. Charlie is still in braces, and Betty Grace is coming on as well as can be expected. Mrs. Smith expects to be out of her wheel chair soon and on crutches. Incidently, the soldier that crossed the double lines and hit their car head-on had no insurance; nor, have his survivers made any attempt at retribution. With all this tremendous financial worry and heartache, Mrs. Smith bears no ill will toward the memory of the soldier that caused her trouble.

HEAD LEAVES CITY UTILITY POSITION

The City's Director of Public Utilities, James W. Head, Jr., submitted his resignation effective April 8.

City Manager Lewis Z. Johnston said the resignation will be accepted.

Mr. Head said he is leaving for "personal reasons."

A resident of the District, Mr. Head is one of four city heads who would be affected by a proposal that would require department heads to live within the limits of Falls Church.

The proposal was given to the Council for study by City Manager, Johnston.

Mr. Head has administered the City's extensive water system since 1950 when he began Falls Church's first Public Utilities Director. Before that, he was with the engineering firm of Wiley and Wilson which initially installed the City's water lines.
