The meeting kicked off with Dianne Cullum, a Career Center Specialist from the Pimmit Hills High School asking for residents' input on the school's mission and values. The school is undergoing an accreditation review and, as part of that process, they are soliciting input from all their various constituencies, including the community. She reaffirmed the school's commitment to being a good neighbor, citing the fact that progress has been made on issue like moving loitering students off of neighborhood corners. She also reminded attendees that they are always welcome to bring issues and concerns relative to the school to the attention of school officials.

The floor was then turned over to Supervisor Stu Mendelsohn and our representative to the County Planning and Zoning Commission Joan DuBois. Supervisor Mendelsohn brought residents up to date on the status of six issues that had been raised during his last visit to meet with members of the PHCA. During his talk, he provided updates and information on a range of topics, including the reason that bus shelters are only on one side of Magarity, the efforts to reduce speeding and cut through traffic in the neighborhood, and the status of plans to add easier and safer transit routes to the West Falls Church Metro. for mass transit in the Tyson's Area. Commissioner Joan Du Bois added her insight on these issues as well. It would take more space than I have here to tell you everything they had to say. PHCA Position on Commons Development

This letter was sent by the Pimmit Hills Citizens Association:

Dear Supervisor Mendelsohn:

I am writing you today to share with you the position of the Pimmit Hills Citizens Association (PHCA) regarding the proposed development of the McLean Commons property.

We, the members and the Board the PHCA, have been closely following the proposal for this property since it first came to our attention last spring. We have met with representatives from the development group and with our neighbors from the McLean Commons Citizens Association. And, based on the information we have collected todate from all sides, we are quite concerned about the impact that this development as proposed will have on both our neighborhood and the surrounding environs. Our concerns center around three main issues traffic, the environment, and quality of life.

As you well know, traffic in and around our neighborhood has increased dramatically over the past decade as Tyson's Corner has continued to grow and develop as a major business center. Navigating the byways that surround our neighborhood, including Route 7 and Magarity Road, is often a major challenge given the volume of traffic. With the advent of a highdensity development on the Commons property thousands of new cars will be added to our roads (up to 10,000 by some estimates). Such an increase would aggravate an already serious congestion problem.

Another concern is the impact that the development plan as proposed will have on our already fragile suburban environment. The developer will be clear-cutting trees to make way for high rise buildings, a process that has the potential to lead to a significant runoff problem. In addition, it is expected that there will be increased noise and air pollution from the ongoing presence of heavy construction equipment and the movement of major amounts of dirt and other construction materials during the long period that would be needed to complete such a large development.

Finally, there is the issue of our quality of life. A high-density development would essentially turn Pimmit Hills into a lonely suburban island in the midst of an urban sea. The buffer zone between our neighborhood and Route 123 would no longer exist, bringing an increase in cut through traffic and noise pollution. We trust that you, as a family man and community advocate, will agree with us that such a prospect is not acceptable.

Change is inevitable, and in many instances it is for the better.



April, Kenny said. He added that volunteers don't need to have any home repair experience to participate. Local businesses helped too, contributing food for the volunteers. comb, the Cypress Vine (Ipomoea quamoclit) looks like a climbing fern sprinkled with white, pink or red starry trumpets. This and the closely related Cardinal Climber (Ipomoea x multifida) are also hummingbird favorites. Both are airy twiners that can be grown over a shrub or columnar evergreen or through a perennial vine such as a Clematis. On the more vigorous side of the fence are the Morning Glories (Ipomoea nil and tricolor). Though related to the two previous vines, the Morning Glories have much larger flowers, some as big as 5 inches across. As their name implies these unfurl their flowers with the sunrise and are gone by the sun's zenith. The colors range from pure white to pink, wine-red, light blue and deep purple. There is one, 'Rose Silk', with open trumpets the color of rosy milk chocolate with a white edge all the way around and foliage liberally splashed with white. And another, 'Mt. Fuji Mix', with variously hued blooms all rimmed and then spoked in white. I've seen these twiners get to the top of a telephone pole by way of the support line, so site these ac-

cordingly. The Moon Vine (*Ipomoea alba*) is the one twiner I won't be without. This vine, with its large tropicallooking, heart-shaped leaves, grows quickly in the heat of summer, making it a great screen. But make sure that your patio furniture is on the sunny side of the trellis for the

best view of an evening show worthy of blender cocktails. As the day wanes and the cool of the evening creeps in, the long, pointed, corkscrewed buds will begin to open, almost as if in time-lapse. In a matter of minutes huge 6-inch, pure white parachutes open to perfume the evening air. One year I paired the white Morning Glory called 'Pearly Gates' with the nightblooming Moon Vine for an extended evening-to-noon display of silky white saucers. My folks plant Moon Vine at the base of their second story deck; the vines quickly climb the supports to ramble through the deck rails and provide an evening display high above the ground. The Scarlet Runner Bean

(Phaseolus) serves double duty. Its clusters of bright red blooms make for a lovely display, and its pods are edible (though maybe not the tastiest bean on the pole). And keeping the vine picked keeps the vine blooming. Along the same lines, but not nearly as tasty is the Purple Hyacinth Bean (Lablab purpureus). The thick foliage of this twining vine is suffused with purple, the upright clusters of flowers are two-tone purple and the large flattened pods are a rich red-purple. Remember, one can never have enough purple.

A small patch of earth or a good size pot, a few seeds and a string or pole, and stand back! You're going vertical with vines!

Y ears ago, before I had a yard of my own, I gardened on a small cement slab patio, growing everything in big black nursery

tubs. Not real attractive as pots go, but they were big and they were free. And once the plants filled out, the containers were hardly noticeable. Most of these pots housed annual vines. Guided up the side of the porch by string, they became a beautiful wall garden by midsummer. I started plants from seed, adding a new variety each spring. Some became favorites and still annually decorate the deck railing out back.

Most flowering vines require lots of sun to perform well, but there are a few that do well in partial shade. One of the showiest of these is the Black-eyed Susan Vine (*Thunbergia alata*), a twiner that produces flat, round flowers of orange-yellow with a black center. This one also comes in a white flowered and an "eye-less" form. Cathedral Bells (*Cobaea scandens*), also known as Cup and Saucer Vine, has never been a vigorous plant for me. But, with its elegant purple or greenish-



white bells and delicate tendrils, it's well worth the effort. One of my all-time favorites, the diminutive Love-in-a-Puff (Cardiospermum halica-

cabum), is great for growing on smaller structures and shrubs. This tendril climber produces small sprays of tiny white flowers that become little green balloons. As the balloon matures and turns tan, this vine's common name becomes evident: each of the three black seeds within is branded with a tiny white heart.

If you're blessed with lots of sun, your vine choices really open up. A recent newcomer to the vine scene, *Mina lobata*, hasn't yet adopted a well-known common name. Handsome trilobed leaves tinged purple form a lovely foil for forked stems full of small banana-like flowers. The flower color is hard to pin down -- the buds at the tips start red, turn orange, then yellow and finally white as the banana blossoms just barely open. Hummingbirds find this vine worth fighting over.

With leaves cut like a fine-tooth continued on page 24

T he longer days and warm weather have drawn us outside, into our backyards and next to the grill. At least, that's where I've been! But don't forget about the front yard--those longer days provide hours of opportunity for improving your home's curb appeal!

Improving your home's curb appeal takes some planning, but it can be fun, and the results are well worth the effort. Start your planning by crossing the street to your neighbor's house. Turn around and take a look at your home. Do you need a dose of curb appeal? If you find it hard to be objective about your own home, take a few photos and show them to someone who's not afraid to be honest-you know, that friend or relative who's happy to tell you when you've gained a few pounds, or share their opinion of your new haircut!

Don't worry – sprucing up the front of your home doesn't have to cost much. The key to success is to not take on too much at once. Start small – plant flowers one month, paint the shutters the next. Hold on to your "before" pictures so you'll be able to compare and see your progress along the way – and to put next to the "after" pictures when you're done! There are five major areas to focus on:

Fences. If you have a fence around the front of your yard, take a look at it from across the street and consider how much of the view it takes up. Probably a lot-which means it should have high priority on your curb appeal list. Make sure it's in good shape-does it need mending? Does it need paint? Or is it such an eyesore or require so much work that you'd be better off just replacing it - or even removing it altogether? There are as many different ways to "enclose" your front vard as there are houses - just a short walk through the neighborhood and you'll be full of ideas - a white picket fence? Or maybe hedges are more your style, or even a raised flowerbed - or maybe you love the look of an uninterrupted green lawn all the way to the curb.

Vegetation. This includes lawns, trees, shrubs, shrubs that have grown to the size of trees, vines, weeds, flowers, etc. Get out the pruners, clippers, edgers and mowers and show 'em who's boss! Trim shrubs down to below the windows and away from the doors. If you have trees with low hanging

pring rains may have done more than bring forth the beauty of your landscaping. Rain in under-performing gutters and downspouts can damage your siding or force its way up under your roofing. It can also pool in an area causing basement leaks or it can seep into your crawl space where it provides a breeding ground for mosquitoes.

The best time to inspect your rain handling system is during the rain! Get out the umbrella and boots and walk around your home in a good storm, but not if there's lightening! Look for sagging areas in a long run of gutter where water is spilling over the top instead of running to the downspout. Could it be clogged with leaves and debris? Or has the seam or fastener given way? Also check the flow from the downspouts to insure it moves away from the house .

My Pimmit model has a triangle (gable) formed by the sides of the roof over the front door. Rain flowing down the roof valley had damaged the wood forming the corner of the house. When I had the gutters replaced, I added a corner gutter and downspout at the end of this gable. Now the water is caught and carried to the ground protecting the siding. I also changed the rear downspout location from the west corner to the east. Now it spills on the lower side of the lot and flows away from the

house. No more spring pond in the backyard!

Though you can install gutters and downspouts yourself, it's a two person job. Another negative is that the home stores don't carry a length to reach from one side of the house to the other without a seam. Seams invariably leak over time. My recommendation is to hire a contractor who specializes in extruded aluminum gutters. These are formed on your site to your home's exact measurements. Ask for 6" downspouts. They do a much better job of handling leaves and debris than the standard 4" size.

Will you add screens or not? Debris still gets into the gutters even with screens and they make the job of cleaning the gutters harder - or more expensive. But if you leave the gutters open, you'll need to be conscientious about cleaning them before a fall rainstorm makes it a much more difficult job.

A standard Pimmit house with a bump out addition and four 6" downspouts will cost about \$400-\$500 for the labor and materials to remove and replace all gutters and downspouts. This includes disposal of the old guttering. Planning to replace the siding or the roof? Hold off on replacing gutters. These come down as part of the siding or roofing work.ca

branches that block the sidewalk in front of your home, trim them up. Edge the lawn along your sidewalk and driveway. If you haven't edged in a while, it may take two or more passes to get a clean edge, but the nice, finished look you'll have in the

end is worth it! And finally, pull weeds and add mulch to flowerbeds and around shrubs. Not only does it look great, it will retain moisture and help your plants survive the hot summer months!

Junk. I'll admit it — I've got a few extra empty planters sitting around, and that definitely doesn't add curb appeal. What's in your yard? Broken toys, old cars, piles of cinderblocks, or that stray soda bottle some jerk carelessly tossed into your beautiful yard? Clean up the junk, remove debris, bundle up that pile of sticks you started last fall and get rid of it. Or at least hide it around back or in the shed so it won't interfere with your curb appeal!

Fixtures. Things like the porch light, your house numbers, and mailbox. If you've ever heard "it's the details that count," they were probably talking about the front of someone's house. It's amazing what a new light, new house numbers and a new mailbox will do for a home—and for relatively little investment. All are available at Home Depot for pretty reasonable prices we got our new porch light for \$14!

(Although now I wish we'd invested a bit more and bought one of the motionsensor ones!) You may even consider installing lowvoltage lighting along the path to your door, or opt for solar-powered lamps that don't require any wiring at

all. Either one makes a big difference in your home's twilight and nighttime curb appeal, not to mention making the path a bit safer for you!


The Entrance. Your front door speaks volumes about you and your home, probably without you ever realizing it. Do you want it to say "neglected" or "fabulous"? You may not need a new door - if it's in good shape, a fresh coat of paint will do the trick. Consider adding shiny accessories, like a new brass knocker, or new handle and deadbolt. We ended up investing in a new door-with a decorative window in it - and every day when I pull into the driveway, and walk through my new front door, I know it was worth the cost because I feel so good about how it looks!

And that's the fun part of curb appeal – creating a space in front of your home that makes you feel really good about how your home looks. Well, it's also pretty fun to hear the compliments and have your neighbors say WOW!!ca

Donnie Dick's Heard Through the Grapevine

I attended the PHCA Yard Sale on April 20th. While there, I noticed several broken windows in the Association's office building. I can only assume that this was done by local vandals. Parents, do you know where your children are? This

senseless destruction of Community property is an expense only to the residents of Pimmit Hills. Maybe someone living in that area has seen or heard something and could be helpful in apprehending the guilty ones?

In the May issue of the Grapevine, I was ruminating about the State Lottery and asked for help from our computer friends. Beware of what you ask for because you might receive it. Well I did. Irv Poole of Pimmit Drive downloaded a publication entitled Virginia Lottery General Information. For some reason, the Lottery Board has copyrighted the publication and I would need their permission to publish it. I therefore will have to paraphrase the information. Besides, it doesn't contain all of the pertinent data.

Virginia established a lottery in 1987. One-third of the lottery proceeds are sent to the Commonwealth and our elected officials determined how to spend it.

The money collected by the lot-



tery is divided up by the winners, lottery expenses and the Commonwealth (an average of 35% of the take). In 1989, the state's share has changed to be used for capital construction projects. Then from 1990 to 1998, the proceeds were transferred to

the General Fund. Finally in 1999, lottery proceeds were distributed to local public school division to be used solely for educational purposes.

The publication does not define what a local school division is or what constitutes an educational purpose nor does it show how much of the proceeds are distributed to each locale. In fiscal year 2001, the lottery turned over to the Commonwealth of Virginia \$1329.2 million. How much of this was raised in Fairfax and how much was distributed to the Fairfax School Board is not indicated in this publication. The Lottery Board also distributed \$97.7 million of unclaimed prizes to some entity named The Literary Fund. So there in a nutshell is what I found.

Now for the blockbuster I promised in the May issue. I started the "Heard Through the Grapevine" column because I thought the Pimmit Hills Dispatch was not providing the


