

ello Neighbors - There was a great turnout for the September meeting — nearly 50 people were in attendance! Let's get even more for the October 2 meeting when we'll be able to voice our opinions about the proposed McLean Commons redevelopment.

In the absence of President Joe Baker, 1st Vice President Bill Niland ran the meeting. Dispatch Editor Cindy Kwitchoff gave a brief explanation about the new bulk mailing of the paper and the various things that must happen in order for it to arrive at 1,684 houses in Pimmit Hills each month, hopefully before the scheduled meeting. The post office can deliver the Dispatch anytime from 2 days to 3 weeks after it is dropped off at the post office. Bulk mailing of the monthly paper will be on a trial basis for one year.

We're pleased to announce that Ray Bernot of Leonard Road volunteered to serve as the PHCA 2nd Vice President and was given wide support from those in attendance. Now that school is back in session, please pay close attention to school buses.

Questions and concerns about the future development plans in our area will be addressed at the October 2 meeting.

If you observe that any sign, street or otherwise, has been knocked down or is missing, please call 703-934-2840. This could trigger a life or death situation if an emergency vehicle is unable to located a house because of a missing or downed sign.

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
Possible Redevelopment of The Commons

I f you have ever shopped at The Commons Safeway on Colshire Drive in McLean or pumped gas at The Commons Shell, you have stood in the middle of The Commons apartment complex, perhaps without even noticing it. You may not have paid much attention to the surrounding brick apartments with their distinctive arched

windows. But over the next few months, there will be a great deal of attention paid to The Commons apartments. Their new owners want to tear The Commons down and build a high-rise apartment community in its place.

The Commons were built, in stages, in the mid- to late-1960's by West*Group. The Commons Shopping Village was included for the convenience of Commons residents and the surrounding community. The buildings were designed by acclaimed architect Charles Goodman, who also designed the original National Airport. The Commons is comprised of 577 apartment units, including 28 rental townhomes, ranging in size from one to four bedrooms. Their distinctive architecture—characterized by



large balconies and dramatic arched windows and their beautiful 33-acre grounds provide a cherished home for The Commons residents and make The Commons truly unique among rental properties.

In November of last year, West*Group sold The Commons apartments to Commons Investors LLC, a group of investors

among whom Mr. Ralph Dweck holds the primary interest, for \$73 million. It is the intention of Mr. Dweck and his associates to tear down The Commons in order to build a new apartment complex that would contain 5,000-6,000 one and two bedroom luxury apartment units in buildings ranging from 4 to 15 stories, as well as a high-rise hotel. Construction—or should I say destruction of The Commons—would begin in the spring of 2004. . . and would last approximately 10 years!

How would this redevelopment of The McLean Commons affect Pimmit Hills? To start with, Pimmit Hills citizens living on or near Magarity Road would be subjected to a decade of noise and considerable



quantities of dust in the air, as would the unfortunate students and staff of Westgate Elementary School, which is located right next door to the project. The exorbitant number of apartment units that is being proposed would bring an estimated 10,000 more cars onto Magarity, Anderson, and Chain Bridge Roads daily. Anyone who has occasion to travel those roads can imagine the gridlock. As I'm sure many of you know, The Commons Safeway had planned to start construction on a bigger and better Safeway this year. Mr. Dweck's redevelopment plan includes provisions for a new Safeway store, but not on the current Safeway site. According to the redevelopment plan, Safeway's new store would be part of a retail plaza, which would be located near Magarity Rd., where apartments now stand. New apartments would be built where Safeway is now. Safeway would not have a new store until 2006, or thereabouts, if all goes well for the developers.

The residents of The Commons have formed the McLean Commons Citizens Association (MCCA), whose immediate objective will be to prevent the destruction of The Commons apartments and the lovely property on which they sit. Right now, the Comprehensive Plan, Fairfax County's guide to what types of development should go where, specifies that The Commons is in a transitional area between the communities of McLean,

Pimmit Hills and the more urban development of Tysons Corner. The current density of The Commons is appropriate for a transitional area. Mr. Ralph Dweck and his associates want to amend the Comprehensive Plan to accommodate the much higher density that they are proposing. Next spring the Fairfax County Planning Commission will hear arguments concerning Mr. Dweck's amendment proposal from the developers and from those who oppose their plans. The Planning Commission will decide whether or not to amend the Comprehensive Plan in such a way that would allow for much higher density in The Commons. If they do pass the amendment, the issue will go on to the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors (more hearings), who must also approve the amendment. If the developers succeed in amending the Comprehensive Plan, they must then apply for a change in zoning. A very big change in zoning. Changes in zoning must also pass both the Planning Commission and the Board of Supervisors. The process of getting both the Plan amendment and the zoning changes passed would take about 2 years.

The MCCA will rigorously oppose the Plan amendment and zoning changes every step of the way, and will fight to preserve The Commons and keep inappropriate density, and all that comes with it, out of our community and off of the doorstep of Pimmit Hills.cs

lion years, its fan shaped leaves turning a lovely yellow before dropping. Number 14: Yellowwood (Cladrastis kentukea). Another golden boy, this one with lovely clusters of pendulous white flowers in May.

Number 13: Red Maple (Acer rubrum). Not always red in autumn, this one can range from lemon-yellow to dark red; check the variety name before buying. Number 12: Witchhazel (Hamamelis virginiana). Yellow fall foliage accompanies the small golden flowers of this late-blooming woodland native. Number 11: Sassafras (Sassafras albidum). A thicket-forming tree whose mitten leaves are a blend of yellow, orange, scarlet and maroon. Number 10: Stewartia (Stewartia pseudocamellia and sinensis). The first a mix of yellow, red and burgundy, the second a fiery scarlet even in the shade. Number 9: Paperbark Maple (Acer griseum). Hot russet-red against warm, rich cinnamon bark in late fall keeps a body toasty! Number 8: Sourwood (Oxydendrum arboreum). Either a mix of yellow, red and purple or a glowing red; shop for this one in fall color. Number 7: Golden Larch (Pseudolarix amabilis). I guess the name gives away the fall color, but it's always a surprise when this conifer drops its needles in October!



Number 6: Dawn Redwood (Metasequoia glyptostroboides). Another deciduous conifer, this one a orangey-cinnamon -spectacular at sunset on a late autumn day. Number 5: Hickory (Carya). If you've got this one already,

you've got gold ... and probably lots of squirrels! Number 4: Black Gum (Nyssa sylvatica). Nothing bigger, better or redder in our forests. Number 3: Japanese Maple (Acer palmatum). Whether you choose an up-right or a cut-leaf, weeping variety with green, red or variegated foliage, you're sure of a great autumn display. Number 2: Franklin Tree (Franklinia alatamaha). The only thing that improves this display of orange and red foliage is when it coincides with the last of its white blossoms. Aaaand the number 1 pick for fantastic fall foliage is ... may we have another drum roll, please? ... our own state flower, the Flowering Dogwood (Cornus florida)!!! Who can argue with that long-lasting, rich burgundy-red fall color, especially when sprinkled with a good set of red berries?! Enjoy the fall season!ca

A Spy in Our Backyard?

In August, the Washington area heard the news that yet another person had been arrested by the FBI for espionage. This time it was a 38 year old retired Air Force sergeant who worked at the National Reconnaissance Office in Chantilly, VA. The NRO manages America's spy satellites. His name is Brian Regan of Bowie, MD, and according to the affidavit, he used our library for his alleged espionage activity.

In the Fall of 2000, the FBI found out that someone was providing another country with classified US Government documents. The affidavit does not state the name of the country, but media reports believe it is Libya. There were three other countries that Regan had contacted and/or was attempting to sell classified information. He told them to respond to him via an email address he had set up under another name on a free email provider.

Regan accessed this email at two different libraries near his home. However, he also checked it at the public internet computers located in our Tysons-Pimmit Library on Leesburg Pike, which was along the route Regan used to commute to work.

This past June, the FBI placed Regan under surveillance. They watched him as he logged onto the internet at a public library. After he was finished and left the library, the FBI went to the computer he was using and was able to see which websites Regan had visited because he hadn't signed off. One of the sites gave the address of the diplomatic offices of Country "C" located in Switzerland, while another was a hotel in Zurich. He then got on an airplane at Dulles Airport and flew to Europe.

Last month, in August, Regan told his coworkers he was driving his family (wife and four children) to Florida for a vacation at Disney World. But in fact, he was make an unauthorized trip overseas to Switzerland. At 5:30 pm on Thursday, August 23, as he was going to board a Lufthansa flight at Dulles, the FBI arrested him. Among the items they found on him were encrypted messages, a hand-held GPS unit, and the addresses of foreign embassies he had looked up on the internet at a library. No explanation of why he spied, but he was \$53,000 in debt.

Washington can be considered the "Spy Capital of the World" because of the amount of espionage that goes on here, even as we see in our backyard. There is a tour called "SpyDrive" which shows actual espionage-related sites in Washington, DC and it is given by retired FBI, CIA and KGB officers. Y ears ago I lived in a small town in the Colorado Rockies at 9,600 feet above sea level. At that altitude fall color, though spectacular in its setting, is brief and limited to a couple of species of deciduous trees and a handful of shrubs. We are indeed fortunate to have the

lengthy, evolving autumn display that clogs the country roads with weekend oglers each October. And for those of us who find ourbecoming selves hermits beltway mountains (the might as well be the dark side of the moon on a Friday afternoon), our gar-

dens and neighborhoods must substitute for weekend get-aways. So, as a guide to future landscape additions, I offer my "Top Ten" fall color list ... which is actually a "Top Twenty" list because it was too hard to whittle it down any further!

Okay. Drum roll, please! Number 20: the Blueberry (Vaccinium corymbosum). Not just for pancakes anymore, this mounding deciduous shrub becomes a melange of yellow, bronze, orange and red in fall. Number 19: the Mapleleaf Viburnum (Viburnum acerifolium). Quite happy in the heavy shade of our forests, this rather open shrub develops the rarest shades of red to rose to lavender-purple -- one for

the leaf collection. Number 18: Spice-bush (Lindera benzoin). Another denizen of woodland shade, the lemony scented leaves turn a sunny yellow. Number 17: Crape Myrtle (Lagerstroemia indica and hybrids). Better known for summer display,

this one nevertheless puts on a good show with yellow to orange to red to maroon foliage, depending on the variety. Number 16: Ashe Magnolia (Magnolia ashei). Wow your neighbors with the biggest, buttery-yellow leaves in your zip code! Number 15: Ginkgo (Ginkgo biloba). This guy (be sure to plant a male clone) has been around for 150 mil-

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
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
