ASSOCIATION MEETING - The fifth general meeting in the current session of the Pimmit Hills Citizens Association will be held at 8:00 P.M. TUBSDAY, JANUARY 6 in the PIMIT HILLS SCHOOL.

CURBS AND GUTTERS for SECTIONS 1 through 5 will be the primary agenda item for the Association's December meeting. The present status of this long term project and immediate action required on the part of affected residents are probably the most important subjects to be taken up by the Association this year and are certainly of extreme consequence to residents of Sections 1 thru 5. We hope all residents of these sections will read the information in this Newsletter and make every effort to attend and to complete and mail or bring in the enclosed ballot so as to express their opinions on this subject.

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Special Notice

IMEEDIATE ACTION ON CURBS AND GUTTERS REQUIRED OF RESIDENTS IN SECTIONS 1 THROUGH 5

Since 1951, as many of you know, the Association has sponsored a project to provide sorely needed curbs, gutters, street widening and integrated storm drainage improvements in Pimmit Hills Subdivision Sections 1, 2, 4, 5 and part of 3. (These are the sections nearest Falls Church.) The project recently suffered a serious blow when it was learned that state legislation supporting the whole financial structure which was proposed to raise funds for the project appears inadequate and apparently impossible of correction. A brief sketch of the history and development of the project and the legal problem involved appears on page 4. Hore complete information and opportunity for discussion will be offered at the Associations's January 6 meeting.

At any rate, we are now faced with the prospect--if we are to salvage the project at all-of revising radically our whole approach for financing the improvements. This would mean dropping the idea to "build now, pay later" provided by earlier plans and adopting a payas-you-go-plan.

The pay-as-you-go approach, referred to more formally as "building a capital improvement fund," consists of authorizing Fairfax County to increase real estate taxes on the properties in the area needing the improvements for a period of 10 years. Actual construction of the facilities under this plan would, we understand, commence at such time as sufficient funds has been accumulated through the extra taxes. The average amount of the extra tax over the 10 year period, we are told, would be about three dollars a month--about the same as that required to pay the bill under the previous plans for repayment of a bond issue. # ACTION ON CURBS AND GUTTERS (Cont'd)

The new plan, we understand, has already received tentative endorsement by some responsible county officials. BUT...in order for the County Executive to decide whether this particular project can be included in the next county budget, <u>a substantial indication of sup-</u> port by residents of Sections 1 through 5 is needed by January 15, 1959.

Therefore, in order to secure evidence of the degree of support for the new plan, we ask that residents of Sections 1 through 5 fill out the ballot-type questionnaire provided below and either bring it to the Association's meeting Tuesday, January 6 or mail it to Association President Douglas E. Glass, 409 Lisle Avenue immediately.

We realize that residents in the affected sections were polled before on the subject of curbs and gutters. However, many of those previously polled have moved away and new residents have taken their places. The opinion of the current residents on the present proposal is absolutely necessary. (Two copies of the ballot are furnished so that husband and wife may both express their opinions.)

# HISTORY OF CURBS AND GUTTERS PROJECT

In the early days of the Curbs and Gutters project a number of alternative methods of securing the improvements were investigated, every effort being made to try to take into account the various legal, financial and practical considerations involved. Several approaches were thrown out because they promised to be either impractical or impossibly expensive for the homeowner. (Several of these approaches could be taken today, but they are still just as impractical or expensive.)

The alternative adopted was to have established a "Sanitary District," which is a legal status given under Virginia law to a carefully defined geographic area for some specific purpose such as installation of curos, gutters, streetlights, etc. For our purpose, however certain changes had first to be made in existing Virginia sanitary district ordinances in order to permit the county to issue bonds in the amount we needed and then repay the principal and interest on the bonds over a period of fifteen years through increased taxes levied against the properties included in the sanitary district.

During one session of the Virginia General Assembly several years back, our Association in cooperation with the Bell Mir Association helped get changes made in the sanilary district laws, which, apparently was thought by all concerned to provide us with the legal foundation we needed to move ahead in this direction. Next, we had a rough estimate made of construction costs by the Highway Commission and an engineering consultant. The resulting figure was about (225,000. . . . . then went through a series of required maneuvers and in 1956 succeeded in having the "curb-andgutterless" areas recognized as Sanitary District No. 8. The next major steps were to get a bond brokerage to agree to sell county bonds at reasonable interest rates, and to hold a referendum for voters residing in Sanitary District No. 8 to approve an increase in their property taxes so the county could pay off the bonded debt. This was to be followed by final engineering work, bond sales, construction contract arrangements, and finally actual construction. In 1957 contacts were made with bond brokerages and, late in the same year, preliminary preparations were made for the referendum. Construction was expected to start in the spring of 1958. ... Then the bad news came in. The bonding attorneys studying our plan concluded that the revised sanitary district statute might prove inconsistent with the Virginia Constitution. This they believed rendered the proposed bond issue unsound and, hence, unsaleable on the bond market. During the 1958 session of the General Assembly our representatives attempted to remedy the situation by proposing additional legislation, but this too failed. Latest reports are that financing the project through a bond issue is virtually hopeless and that our only practical solution is adoption of the payas-you-go plan discussed on page 1.
