RESIDENTS INVITED TO HEAR PLAN FOR PURCHASE OF COLLUNITY RECREATION CENTER PROPERTY

Aside from the Association's annual election of officers, the feature of the May 5 meeting will be presentation of a plan of action for possible purchase of nearby land as a site for a long-sought community center.

A tentative offer of property adjacent to the community was made earlier this year. As this issue of the Newsletter goes to press, the Association's Executive Committee is meeting in a special session to continue working out a plan to enter into preliminary negotiations for purchasing and developing it. Details of the Committee's proposals, of course, are not yet known. Presumably, however, they will involve some form of incorporation, taking an option on the land, an outline of initial facilities construction, supporting financial program and, of course, negotiation with both the landowner and the County for purchase, financing, development and use. (Next Column) The Community Center and Curbs and Gutters Projects are Association activities we sometimes get tired of talking and hearing about. Nevertheless, we know that community development is, at best, a slow, complex and tedious process. We also know that both these projects are of topmost priority to all of us and to our families.

Therefore, in spite of the risk of disappointment that so frequently follows our periodic efforts in behalf of the Community Center Project, we hope you'll be sure to be at the Association's meeting and take part in discussion of this important subject.

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ELECTION OF OFFICERS FOR 1959-60

The Association's lay meeting includes its annual election of officers for the following year. In the April meeting, nominations of candidates previously announced in the Newsletter were made and accepted. Space and time prohibited publication of background on the candidates in our April issue, so the information is provided below. (Because of space limits, full backgrounds are given on candidates for principal offices only.)

FOR PRESIDENT (one candidate):

<u>Hr. Mayne E. Comer</u>, 425 Leonard Rd., is a graduate of the University of Linnesota and holds a law degree from the University of Richmond, Virginia. He has lived in Pimmit Hills about 5 years and is engaged in the 'general practice of law with his own law office at Falls Church's 'est End Shopping Center. He is married and has one child. Comer served part of last year and all of this as the Association's Lembership Committee Chairman and this year as Advertising Lanager for the Newsletter. He has also been active for some time in a number of other organizations such as Barbershop Quartet, veterans' groups, etc.

FOR VICE PRESIDENT (two candidates):

ir. Douglas. E. Glass, 409 Lisle Ave., has wife, Mary, and their three children have lived in Pimmit Hills for the past six and a half years. It hardly needs be said that Doug has served and worked very hard as President of the Association this past year. In addition to the usual duties of this office, Glass has participated heavily in activities of many other groups in the community and the county in an effort to develop greater cooperation among these groups in matters of mutual interest. The time and effort he has spent in these worthy endeavors is little known to most and considered remarkable by the few who worked most closely with him. Doug also carries a very heavy schedule as a Cartographic Engineer with the Air Force.

The last class day is June 5. Students will return to the school for $l_2^{\frac{1}{2}}$ hours on June 9 to pick up their report cards.


