President's Report...

The construction recently commenced on the east side of Lisle Avenue, near Route 7 is not the beginning of the rapid transit system into Washington, as some citizens have suspected.

It is, however, the installation of sidewalks leading to the Pimmit Hills School. Sidewalks will also be installed on the west side of Lisle Ave. only from the school property northward to a point where it will join the existing sidewalks. Griffith Koad will also receive sidewalks on the north side of the street from Lisle Avenue to Route 2709.

The funds for this construction are being provided by the School Board of Fairfax County under special legislation authorizing such construction.

Obviously the sidewalks are being placed on the most heavily traveled streets, and will be beneficial to the safety and well-being of our children, something which deeply affects our community.

Lest this article be misconstrued, it should be clearly understood that the success of obtaining the sidewalks was not solely the result of the Citizens Association.

In more recent years the PTA has been most active in this field and of course some credit should go to individual citizens who accepted the responsibility of contacting County Officials on this matter.

The lesson to be learned from this is, in my opinion twofold. The first is that effective community action can accomplish a great deal. second point is aimed at those persons who are forever asking What was accomplished by the Association last month?" It is certainly true that the Association does not have a satisfactory result to report every month. The reason being, that many projects must, of necessity, consume many months --indeed years - of work.

The foregoing brings us to a discussion of our immediate problem more commonly referred to as "apartments."

A full report will be given at the Dec. meeting. Is it too much to ask that you, individually lend your support by attending our meeting and giving us your ideas?

THE COUNTY FEDERATION

The regular November meeting of the Fairfax County Federation of Citizen's Associations was devoted to the subject of planning and zoning.

A guest panel, consisting of Mr. Stephen Hartwell (member of Planning Commission), Mr. William Burrage (Chief of Planning Staff), and Mr. Albert J. Klingle (Director of the Industrial Development Commission), was on hand to answer questions presented by members of Planning and Zoning and Industrial Development Committees of the Federation.

Panel members answered questions on Site Plan procedures, advance zoning for industry, policy on apartment and industrial zoning, and problems related to advance notice to citizens regarding hearings on soning.

During the course of the meeting, Mr. Burrage admitted that interested citizens groups have a right to be notified that specific hearings are being held, but pointed out that this was difficult to do since the agenda was usually fixed only at the last moment.

After the panel program, Jule Sugarman, President of the Federation, announced that a resolution on Service and Hospitality to International Visitors, submitted by Albert D. Biderman of Holmes Run Acres, was referred to Boris Mandrovsky for study and evaluation.

Larry Short, Ed Langland, and Jennie and Boris Mandrovsky represented Pimmit Hills at the Federation meeting.

CAPITAL FUNDS CRUSADE NEARS CLOSE

The Capital Funds Crusade, being conducted by St. Luke's Methodist Church, is nearing its close. To date, almost \$58,000 has been subscribed by the members and friends of St. Luke's, with approximately 23 visits yet to be made, and 42 requests which were sent by mail to out-of-town members. It is expected that a total of between \$60,000 and \$65,000 will have been subscribed when all visits have been made and all replies by mail have been received.

The visitation program began on Sunday, November 12, 1961, with a luncheon for the workers and Crusade Committee. which was held at 12:30 P.M. in the Fellowship Hall at St. Luke's. After a short period of instruction by Reverend William J. Miller, Crusade Director, the workers, divided into teams of two persons, began their visitation. Supper was served in the Fellowship Hall between 5 and 7:00 P.M.. after which, the teams continued their visits.

Above is a picture of the

proposed addition to St. Luke's, which will contain 12 classrooms, a choir room, office, and small chapel, totaling approximately 12,000 square feet. Some of the money raised will be used to pay for the blacktopping of the entrance road to St. Luke's and the parking areas, which was completed about two weeks ago. A portion of the money will be St. Luke's contribution toward the Higher Education Program of \$7,000,000 being raised by all Methodist Churches in Virginia.

This Educational Building will be the second of a threeunit plant. The third and final unit, a permanent airconditioned sanctuary seating 350, is expected to be completed by 1975. The present combination sanctuary-fellowship hall will be enlarged and beautified using some of the money raised during this Cru-

sade.

The minister, Reverend W. Jeryl Fink, and the members of the Crusade Committee wish to thank all those who have worked so diligently and those who have given unselfishly to help make this Crusade a success.
