Here is what we hope will be the final sequel to the Pimmit Hills sewer plant story.

It was announced very recently that the Fairfax County Water Authority has completed negotiations with the Pimmit Service Corporation for the purchase of the Pimmit Service treatment plant and the water system at a cost of \$1,150,000.

The Authority Chairman said existing sewer plant would be abandoned.

No date has been mentioned as yet for the connection to the County pipe line.

From the timing of the announcement, it is suspected that the development may have been closely related to recent discussions between the P.H.C.A. and members of the Legislature.

AIRPORT ACCESS ROUT

We have been advised by some of our neighboring Citizen's Ass'ns that the stand which our Association took recently by way of a letter to the F.A.A. was believed to have been an important factor in preserving the part of the rout called section III as previously published.

Just as the published rout was due to be adopted as final by the F.A.A., there was some agitation in certain quarters to have this section of the rout moved south which would have meant crossing over some Pimmit Hills lots.

This year marks the Golden Jubilee of boy scouting in this country and there will be nation-wide observance. The big event of their fiftieth anniversary will be a national Jamboree at Colorado Springs, Colorado where approximately 50,000 scouts will attend.

At the same time the boys received their badges, the mothers were presented miniature pins denoting their son's rank. Afterwards, coffee and cookies were served.

Scouting's Golden Jubilee Year will be a year-long celebration and the plans of Troop 984 for the ensuing year include participating in the Jubilee Camporee, July 22-23, at which time all scouts in every District and Council in the country will camp-out. Troop 984 will also spend a week at Camp Thunderbird at Lake Sherando, located in the George Washington National Forest in the heart of the Blue Ridge Mountains. Also, in the near future, the troop plans to enter the first aid contest for the Fairfax District to be held at Jeb Stuart High School and all of the boys are making an effort to receive a Fiftieth Anniversary badge. If 50% of the scouts receive this badge, the troop will be given the Eisenhower Banner for their troop flag.





OUR "TERRIBLE TEENS"

There has probably never been a period in our history when our youth was subjected to such severe criticism as it is today. Some of this criticism is undoubtedly warranted, but much of it is not. Unfortunately, our news media find this a subject with "sales appeal" and it is not uncommon to find many of the incidents they report exaggerated beyond all proportion.

As adults, we find it very easy to blame our youth for many of the conditions which exist today. Yet the truth of the matter is that we ourselves are responsible for the lack of planning which permitted communities to mushroom without providing adequate recreational facilities for our youth, or ourselves.

It was recognition of these facts that prompted a small group of residents in this community to organize the Pimmit Hills Teen Club four years ago. The effort which these prople have put forth has not gone unrewarded. During these years we have watched our young people acquire a sense of good citizenship and belonging. The Teen Club has been an outlet for the many favorable qualities that can be recognized in our youth if we only look for them.

I will not try to delude you into thinking that we have completely wiped out mischief, and I don't think we ever will. But the fact that the Teens in our community have done so many commendable things of their own volition is something of which we can all be proud. They do much more than just have dances every Saturday night.

Let me cite a few of their accomplishments:

1. Each Christmas they make a sizeable contribution; either to known needy families or individuals or to an organized charity. This past Christmas they contributed \$60.00 to a young boy in McLean who had to undergo a brain operation.

2. They have assisted the PTA and the Civic Association in many civic projects. The most recent was the PTA Open House during the Christmas holiday. 3. They organized a group to clean up the grounds and trim the shrubbery at the Cerebral Palsy Center in Falls Church.

4. They assist in practically every charity fund drive.

5. They conduct benefit dances whenever misfortune strikes one of their own group or one of their benefactors. The most recent was for Mrs. Irmingard Smith, a former member of the Teen Club Committee who is in Arlington Hospital.

6. Each year they contribute a sizeable sum to the Pimmit Hills School Activity Fund.

7. They contribute annually to the Foreign Exchange Student Fund at McLean High School.

These are just a few of the ways in which the teens of our community have shown that they want to be good citizens. There are still others which space does not permit me to list.

It is therefore a necessity that the Teen Club continue to exist in Pimmit Hills. It is now the oldest Teen Club in Northern Virginia and I know that you want it to continue its good work. It will! But it will take cooperation and patience and guidance from dedicated adults. We ask your help in leading our youth to even greater things than they have accomplished in the past.

Your child is eligible for membership if he is between 14 and 19 years of age, or at age 13 if he is in high school. All he or she has to do is come to a Saturday night dance and file an application.
