There's only one way to prove to the officers of the Association that you are not the kind of a person I have described above. You can prove me wrong by coming to the meeting at the Pimmit Hills School at 8:00 P.M. on Tuesday, February 2, 1960 and voting on the proposed amendment to the Constitution. If you don't, you leave the way open for any question to die on the floor by having me or any other member in attendence kill the issue by simply raising the quorum question. The January meeting was called to order by the president. Mrs. Kathy Bitches served as acting secretary.

Highlights of the meeting were debates on the proposed sales tax tor the State of Virginia and the quorem question in reference to the by-laws of the Association.

A resolution was adopted to the effect that the Association favors such a sales tax but on at least two conditions: First, that the laws conceming allocations of tax revenue as it affects Fairfax County be revised and made more equitable to us.
Secondly, that the personal property tax be eliminated to avoid a too-heavy overall tax burden.

DELINQUENCY REARS HEAD
The Association received reports that during the Holiday season, there was a. certain amount of theivery and vandalism especially in reference to outside Christmas decorations.

This is particularly disheartning not merely because we are proud of the showing made by our community in Holiday decorations but because we are proud also of our youthful citizens and of the excellent record they have been making over the years.

Certainly, this will reflect unfairly on the great majority of Pimmit Hills youngsters. In fact, it was reported that much of the delinquency was on the part of very young boys in the eleven to thirteen age group during late hours when they had no business being out of doors.

So, it appears that the real culprits in this affair were certain parents who simply were not interested enough in their children to properly supervise them or know what they were doing.

Here is a sequel for those of you who read last months article in reference to the "Sewer Question" (opposing additional connections to the Pimmit Service Co. plant)

Recently, the Association President addressed letters and other pertinent documents to our representatives in the Virginia Legislature.

This apparantly had a desirable effect since the Fairfax County Board of Cupervisors, at their Jan. DOth Session ruled to the effect that only after the Plant becomes County property or after the Plant is completely by-passed by the County pipe line, will the fifty taps in question be allowed.
According to Wayne Comer, who has represented the Association at recent hearings, this represents a very favorable milestone in this struggle but we must continue to keep a close watch on the situation. The next jimmediate danger is that the developers may appeal this decision to the Circuit Court.
