County Park Authority Director Fred M. Packard recently announced acquisition of a new 18 -acre community park here. The park, purchased at $\$ 70,760$, is located north of Magarity Road, opposite the Pimmit Hills Elementary School on the former Storm Farm.

The Pimmit Hills Citizens' Association strongly urged acquisition of the park, and was a driving force behind the purchase.

The tract, described as "open, gently rolling land," extends north to Scott's Run. The park development will be undertaken jointly by the Park Authouity and the Citizens Association.
