

out for dangerous or illegal activity in and around the neighborhood. He noted that there was lots of egg throwing in the Hills on Halloween night, as well as some wild driving that led to a number of parked cars getting scraped up. In this particular incident, because a resident was observant, the perpetrator may actually be caught.

Those in attendance were reminded not to miss the December meeting, which will consist of a very short business meeting and then a holiday social. All residents are invited to come out and join us for an evening of fellowship and fun.

The focus of the night's meeting was the response to President Joe Baker's request that we come to a consensus and develop an official position on the redevelopment plans for the Commons. Mira Awad, the Secretary of the McLean Commons Citizens Association, spoke to us and shared the information they have gathered on this project, which was very detailed, interesting and helpful. There was also a lively discussion in which many good points of view were shared. In the end, a motion was made and passed that the Association is in opposition to the redevelopment plans for the Commons as presented. This last piece "as presented" is important to note. As presented, the current development plan leaves room for some valid

questions that the developer does not seem either able or perhaps willing to substantially address. In addition, the Association has concerns about whether or not the developer has the experience to handle a development project with of this size and scope. We all know that change is coming to this area, heck – it's already all around us! What we want to do is be proactive, instead of reactive, and do all we can to ensure that change doesn't translate into a reduction in the quality of our lives here in the Hills.

So, now that we have our "marching orders" the officers of the PHCA will be working throughout the rest of the Association year to reach out to other citizen organizations to see how we can work together on issues of mutual interest, including the Commons Development. We are also going to work on connecting with our elected officials to make sure they know where we stand. In order for both of these efforts to be successful, we need your help. We are forming a Development Committee that will focus in on the Commons Development and lead the way in gathering information and making sure our voice is heard. We thank those who have already signed up to participate on this new committee. If you are interested in getting involved, please email or call PHCA President Joe Baker.

And you can begin it right here, at the library. Tysons Pimmit Regional Library offers an expanding menu of computer training which will take you onto the information super highway, and beyond.





And the McLean Commons Citizens Association (MCCA) hopes to convince the Planning Commission of all of those deleterious effects. One issue that will be addressed is, of course, the environmental damage that a 10-fold in-

crease in density would cause.

While in all development something ecological is lost and something economic and social is gained, the proposed plans for The Commons are especially detrimental. The consequences of replacing the trees and grass grounds of The Commons with concrete would be felt in Pimmit Hills as well as in McLean and Tysons Corner.

There are 455 trees in The Commons, excluding trees that are on Safeway's property, newly planted trees, and trees which lie outside of the fence that runs along the western and southern sides of the property. Further excluding ornamental

because underground parking garages that are wider than the buildings that they sit beneath must be dug out before anything else can be built.

We are all familiar with the traffic congestion in and around Tysons Corner. Ironically, the more cars there are, the more trees are needed to convert carbon monoxide into oxygen. Denser development means fewer trees -but more cars. This scenario does not bode well for our air quality. Fairfax County predicts that it will not meet the federal Clean Air Standards within the required time frame, and we may lose some federal transportation funding as a

Letter to the Editor

Rebuttal to Tim Kramer's November letter to the editor:

Dear Editor,

As I drive down Lisle Avenue and spot another dead cat (somebody's little friend?), I think how easy it is to approve of high-rise apartment buildings in the area if you don't live on Lisle, Griffith Road, Pimmit Drive or Magarity. These streets have become as busy as any County Parkway in the last few years, particularly with the increased enrollment at the Education Center.

Pimmit Hills, with its 1600 homes, already has the population of a small city. Adding to that traffic is the McLean cut-throughs and the Education Center. Since a rail system to serve this immediate area is not under consideration at the moment (thank goodness we are spared the curse of its construction in our front yards!), logic tells us that the more people brought in through development means even more traffic. More buses. And since the "suggested" 25 mph speed limit is scoffed at, we will be seeing more dead pets (my neighbor had lost two).

Mr. Kramer does not take into consideration the safety of other peoples' children and pets. Having lived here for 38 years, his children may have grown up here, but have long since moved on. When we moved here 12 years ago there were only a fraction of the children on this street that there are now. Yet traffic gets worse, people drive faster, neighbors grow more apathetic.

I learned one thing in the petition process for Traffic Calming last winter: it is difficult to convince our neighbors, who don't live on these busier streets, of our plight. Putting high-rise apartments in this already densely populated neighborhood will make our traffic worse. Could it be the reason residents, who have spent lots of money fixing up their property, give up and sell out to landlords? I believe its called urban flight.

But I am convinced that few people are actually persuaded by our rhetoric. Most are motivated to action by money or emotion. We like our property values to go up, but at what cost? A cat? A dog? Someone's child? Does it have to be someone you know in order to matter? Urban sprawl is no respecter of people's quality of life. It may be on the outskirts today, and in your living room a year from now. When it has sufficiently diminished you property value, the County can claim Eminent Domain, pay you "market value," and leave you without a home!

Maybe you don't live on a busy street and have no traffic worries, but you do live on property that developers lust after, and they know how to get it at a price that serves them best!

the woolly adelgid. Fortunately, the dwarf and weeping varieties don't seem to be bothered, and these lowgrowing, graceful evergreens can be handsome additions to the landscape. Rhododendrons, which used to be limited to the large-leaf types, come in a variety of shapes, sizes and colors now. Look for the earlyblooming "P.J.M." series for compact, upright form and 'Ramapo' or 'Purple Gem' for low, cushion habit. For a real miniature Rhodie, plant Rhododendron impeditum: clusters of tiny bluish-purple flowers sit atop even tinier evergreen foliage. Also in the less-is-more class are Sweet Box (Sarcococca hookeriana var. humilis) and the slightly taller Japanese Skimmia (Skimmia japonica). The Sweet Box eventually forms a lovely, foot-tall colony of dark green, while the Skimmia keeps to a neat, low, dome of leathery foliage. All of these evergreens, from the Hemlock on down, would prefer a fairly moist, protected site to be at their best.

For a sunnier site try the Russian Arborvitae (*Microbiota decussata*), a low, spreading evergreen that takes on a purplish hue for the colder months. Another spreader, this time upwards, is the Carolina Jessamine (*Gelsemium sempervirens*). This twining vine, native to the Southeast, decorates itself with lovely evergreen foliage and lovelier yellow trumpets in early to mid-spring and often again in the fall. Another evergreen native, the Live Oak

(Quercus virginiana) of Southern plantation and Spanish Moss fame, will actually grow this far north. There is one in Arlington that has been braving our winters for at least a couple of decades, maybe more. (It does look a bit worse for the wear come April, but then, who doesn't?!)

One of the prettiest sights in November and December is an Ackerman Hardy Camellia in full bloom. Dr. William Ackerman of the National Arboretum used the coldhardy Tea-oil Camellia (Camellia oleifera) to produce a collection of fall and winter flowering trees with blossoms in shades of pink and white. These are not as big and gaudy as the old varieties, but, boy, are these guys tough -- a singleflowered pink called 'Winter Star' survived minus 16 degrees a few years back at Mom and Dad's with hardly a brown leaf.

And last but not least, the Christmas and Lenten Roses (Helleborus hybrids) are the best bet for beating off the mid-winter blues (aside from a couple of months in the Caribbean). These foot-tall, herbaceous evergreens brave the January chill to open beautiful burgundy to pink to white and even green, single "roses" that last well into spring. Reserve a spot by the door for one of these so you won't miss the display as you dash off to the airport for your flight to Jamaica!ca

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
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result. Eliminating mature trees in one of our most congested areas will further impair our ability to meet the Clean Air Standards and erode the quality of the air we breathe.



ography also make it a particularly bad parcel of land to pave over from the standpoint of run-off. The ground elevation drops 90 feet between Magarity Road and Route 123 (Dolley Madison Blvd.), precisely where The Commons sits. In other words. The Commons is on a hill, and Route 123 is at the bottom. of that hill.

We have already seen a problem caused by some trees being removed to accommodate the widening of Route 123, On August 11th, Route 123 flooded between Anderson Road and Colshire Drive due to heavy rains. Scott's Run, one of the six major streams in McLean Planning District, runs under Rt. 123 only a quarter of a mile from The Commons. It also flooded its banks on August 11th due to the unprecedented volume of water flowing into it so quickly, temporarily engulfing the surrounding trees in 2-3 feet of water in swamp-like fashion. Imagine the quantity of water and the speed with which it would flow into Route 123 and Scott's Run if the 40 acres behind those nowtreeless embankments on Route 123 were paved over. Two of the pri-

mary hindrances to good water quality are excessive sediment in our streams and too much water flowing too fast into those streams. Land use is the single most important factor in

protecting water quality. Paving over 40 acres on a hill, with a major stream within a quarter of a mile no less, is bad planning. Replacing trees and grass with impervious surfaces will leave nothing to absorb rainwater, to filter it, or to slow it down before it reaches Scott's Run. This will cause erosion downstream, as well as a virtual lake along Route 123. The developers have not publicly addressed the issue of run-off, so we do not know what water management plans they may have. Keeping large quantities of water off of the sidewalks and roadways can be accomplished with engineering. Slowing that water down presents a more stubborn problem.

Those of us who live at The Commons enjoy the beautiful scenery and the wildlife habitat (25 species of birds spotted from my apartment!) that the 400+ trees in our community provide. But those trees benefit many more people than live at The Commons. With all the congestion and impervious surfaces of Tysons Corner so nearby, the trees in our area are especially valuable for the roles they play in providing us with cleaner air and water.ca

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Pimmit Hills Gardener

W inter's moving in. You can't see it yet, but it's out there just waiting to catch us without our snow shovels handy, without our boots, mittens and long johns out of storage, without our Narcissus bulbs in the ground! Aaaaugh! But this also means that Christmas is almost here! Aaaaugh! No, wait, Christmas: stockings hung from the mantle, fancy tree ornaments, brightly wrapped presents, hard ribbon candy that shortly after opening becomes one big, multicolored rock. Christmas! Freshly cut Firs and Pines! Berry-laden boughs of Holly! Wreaths of Spruce, Boxwood and Southern Magnolia! ... Mistletoe...! At the time when the earth is at its barest and the days are at their shortest and the sun is at its weakest, we decorate with ribbons and glass balls and evergreens, lots of evergreens. Evergreens are a great reminder of the longer, warmer, greener days, and every garden should have plenty to get us through the bleakness of post-Christmas winter.

Most everyone is familiar with the usual evergreens: the Pines (*Pinus*), the Spruces (*Picea*), the Hollies (*Ilex*), the Rhododendrons and Azaleas, etc. But there are tons of other evergreens that are rarely seen in our gardens. Next time you are looking for a fairly fast growing, upright evergreen try the Japanese Cryptomeria (Cryptomeria japonica). This tall, flame-shaped tree with short, green, awl-shaped "needles" makes a great choice for screening and Christmas decorations. Another lovely, columnar evergreen is the Arizona Cypress (Cupressus arizonica) called 'Blue Ice'. Native to the Southwest, but thriving under our East Coast conditions, this wispy, steel-blue tree rivals the bluest of the Blue Spruces without taking up nearly as much space in the garden. If you are really cramped for space but still need to screen off your neighbor's trash cans, try the extremely narrow 'Sky Pencil' Japanese Holly (Ilex crenata). All of the Japanese Hollies are great Boxwood substitutes, especially if you're gardening under less than ideal conditions, and 'Sky Pencil', at less than a foot wide and eight feet tall, is great in tight spots.

In the past Hemlocks (Tsuga canadensis) were widely planted for screening purposes. Unfortunately, they are now being destroyed by a tiny, cottony, sucking insect called

If the Planning Commission passes the amendment to the Master Plan, it will then go to the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors for approval.

Our representatives to these decision-making bodies need to hear from us now, so that when it comes time to vote they will know without question where we stand on this issue.

If you are in opposition to the redevelopment plan as presented, please write, call or e-mail the fol-

lowing people to voice your opinion - even a short message expressing your concerns will help!

Following is the contact information for the Planning Commission and the Board of Supervisors, as well as some general tips.

General Tips

Always use the proper form of address. Each member of the Plan-

ning Commission should be addressed as Commissioner and each member of the Board of Supervisors should be addressed as Supervisor. So, for example, you would begin your letter, email or voicemail with Hello Commissioner Dubois, or Hello Supervisor Mendelsohn.

In your letter, email or voicemail, be sure to provide specific con-

cerns. For example, you may be concerned about the impact the development is going to have on the environment, or the significant increase in cut through traffic the development will bring to the Hills, or the potential for negative impact on the learning environment at Westgate Elementary.

Whatever your areas of concern are, while you do not need to write a book on the subject, you do need to be sure to clearly articulate your objections.

Always be respectful. We are not against the developers themselves, but rather their current plans.

Looking back at old issues of the Pimmit Hills Dispatch, we continue to look at PH 50 years ago in 1958 and 1959.

The November 1958 issue of the Pimmit Hills Citizens Association newsletter had an ad from St. Luke's Methodist Church announcing worship service in its new building on Leesburg Pike....The Pimmit Hills Christmas Decoration contest had four categories: religious, door, window and overall display The December issue had an article called, "Sports in the Hills," by Floyd Flasher. He talked about PH'ers out deer hunting, a new bowling center on Shreve Road, and he put out a call for duckpin bowlers needed for a league.....The newsletter reported the comings and going of PH residents, including a Navy family who were being transferred to Germany. Prior to moving to PH, they lived in Cuba.....The Pimmit Run Unit of the League of Women Voters held a November meeting and the article listed the "girls" who attended.....There was an ad for Walters Majorette School on Broad Street with a drawing of a baton twirler....Trying to finance and build curbs, gutters

and storm drainage continued to be

agers riding school buses to McLean

ruary 1959 issue reported in its Youth News section that some teen-

have been "using offensive lan-

guage" and were put on notice

The issue of school integration - a hot topic in Fairfax County and in Virginia at the time-was discussed at a February 1959 meeting.....The Lemon Road PTA held a "Card Party" (Bridge, Canasta, Pinochle) and the Jubitones Barber Shop Quartet sang at it Dances galore there was a PH Community Valentine dance, a Spring dance in early May and an Inauguration dance in June "in honor of its newly elected officers" (!).....Some adult male drivers were caught drag racing on Pimmit Drive and had their kids in the cars.....1959 prices at Pimmit Drug Center: half-gallon of ice cream was .79 cents, shampoo was .84 cents, gallon of paint was \$5.49, tooth brushes were .9 cents, an umbrella was .87 cents, and whatever "isopropyl alcohol" was, was only .13 cents. Also when you bought something, you received free "King Korn stamps" (?) A local Girl Scout troop was named "Cookie Champs of 1959" for selling 1000 boxes of cookies.....Members of the PH Teen Club appeared on WTTG-TV's "Milt Grant's Record Hop"....1000 polio inoculations took place in Pimmit Hills during the summer of 1959..... Route 123 Widening

R oute 123 is being widened between the beltway and the entrance ramp to I-66. There will be six through lanes (three on each side) for the length of the widening project. However, because numerous turn lanes are also being added,

the road will be at least eight lanes wide (four on each side) for the entire length of the project.

The center of the road will be shifted slightly southward, toward us, and the median strips will be replaced. The median strip that runs between Anderson Road and Colshire

Drive will be wider than the current strip. But all of the other medians will be narrower than they are now and entirely concrete—no grass.

The only wall that will be built is the short wall that you can see now next to the West*Group parking lot near the base of Anderson Road. That big bank of dirt where trees were removed between Anderson Road and Colshire Drive will not be replaced by a wall; it has simply been graded. The new Route 123 will have 5-foot-wide

sidewalks on both sides of the road. Two bus shelters will be installed at Colshire Drive and two at Old Meadow Road. When completed, Route 123 will be nearly twice as wide as it is now between 495 and I-66. Past these points, it will return to a four-lane road.

The Route 123 project was originally scheduled to be completed in October 2002—if all things went perfectly. At this point, it does not appear that it will be finished quite that soon. Utility conflicts (i.e. utility lines not located where they should be, problems

in distinguishing active from abandoned lines) have slowed the project down. A mild winter would help the project make up for lost time.

Mr. Sam Lim is the engineer in charge of implementing the Route 123 widening. He has been very generous with his time and expertise in providing us with this information. Thank you, Mr. Lim!

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
