Currently the board is working with Supervisor Foust and the Fairfax County Attorney on some legal avenues that may be available.

2. Pimmit Hills Dispatch: This newsletter has been published off and on since 1952. I feel that the cornerstone of the PHCA is a newsletter to keep its members informed of upcoming events.

3. Increase Membership: My initial goal is to double the number of regular attendees at the PHCA meetings from around 10 to 20 and to increase the paying members from around 100 to 200. One fortunate change during COVID-19 was the use of Zoom to host the PHCA meetings and it has been a huge success. After COVID-19 ends, we plan on returning to in-person meetings and retaining Zoom as an option as well for those who are unable to attend in person.

4. Events: There are so many fun things that can occur once membership is increased and more members want to get involved and plan things that are meaningful to their families. Events such as block parties, barbecues, organized flea markets, Halloween/Easter judging, and other events that bring people together.

5. Traffic Calming: This measure will increase safety on the streets for all community members from the first day of installation. Pimmit Hills Drive has already benefited substantially from the speed bumps installed recently.

The PHCA has accomplished a lot over the past 70 years, and the future looks bright. I hope to work with the current and future members on a variety of issues. Please feel free to contact me at president@pimmithills.org.

The Pimmit Hills Citizens' Association was founded in 1951 to help the community liaise with neighbors and local government officials. News You Can Use!

The PHCA would like to bring your attention to the following area updates.

• Fairfax County is no longer accepting plastic bags for leaves and yard waste. This is applicable to neighbors with private garbage collection, too. Please only use paper bags or reusable containers.



- Improvements to the Scott's Run Trail are now complete. The 8-foot wide pedestrian trail connects Magarity Rd. at Westgate Elementary to Colshire Meadow Dr. near the McLean Metro Station.
- Fairfax County will begin work soon on a 10-foot wide pedestrian bridge that will cross the 495 beltway and connect to Route 123.



New Pimmit Hills Signs

In 2004, the PHCA raised the funds to install two signs at key entry points into the Pimmit Hills neighborhood. The first and largest sign was installed at the intersection of Pimmit Dr. and Route 7 and the second at Lisle Ave. and Route 7. The signs have proudly served the neighborhood for over 15 years, but they have reached the end of their life expectancy. They have both unfortunately been struck by cars multiple times and the wood has rotted.

The PHCA is exploring new options for the signs, but estimates to replace the current ones exactly as they appear are in the range of \$12,000-16,0000. Therefore, we are exploring other design options. What we ultimately select will depend on the amount of money we can raise.
