## Silver Line Update: Parking Lot at New McLean Station

*n* interim commuter parking L lot will be built next to McLean Metro Station.

This privately-run, pay lot will offer about 711 spaces for commuters, so they can easily access the Silver Line. This lot is a "bridge" solution to encourage ridership on the new rail line during its early years.

CityLine will own, manage and operate the lot, including setting parking rates.

For up to the next 10 years at least, Silver Line riders will be able to park their cars next to the McLean Metro Station when it opens.

In August, the Board ratified an agreement with developer CityLine to provide an interim, commuter parking lot.



# Pimmit Barn Event Likely in October

A fter a petition signed by many neighbors, the 1937 dairy barn that stands at 1845 Cherri Drive (near the corner of Cherri and Lisle) will survive beyond its 75th birthday, and with any luck, live to be 100 or more years as a historic landmark in our neighborhood.

Supervisor Foust met with the organizers of the Pimmit Barn movement and expressed his support for keeping the last surviving dairy barn inside the beltway intact.

Why is there a barn in our neighborhood? According to local history expert Paul Kohlenberger, Anne Magarity sold 80 acres to Lisle Smith, an Assistant Attorney General, neighfor \$10 (or about \$155 today). Smith built the barn and (McLe operated a dairy farm until the land was developed into Pimmit Hills neighborhood. sports

The barn remained, as the neighborhood was not yet connected to the public water system and the barn site housed a well that provided water to the neighborhood.

For a time, the Fairfax County Water Authority owned the site, and since 1997, it has been a property of the Fairfax County Park Authority. Now, McLean Youth Athletics uses it to house athletic equipment for hundreds of children, including our

neighbors (McLean Youth Athletics sports are open to children in Pimmit Hills:

their web site for information on activities and registration).

What's next? Neighbors are forming the Friends of Pimmit Barn, a non-profit organization dedicated to preserving the barn for the benefit of the community.

The first fundraising goal is

\$2,000 for a marker that will tell the story of the barn for all to read. The group is planning to hold the 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual Halloween at the Barn, which may include a 5K fun run.

The agreement comes at no cost to the county because the developer will build, own, run and maintain the lot. The new lot will be built at the site of the Cleveland Building, which was part of the old West Gate office park. City-Line will tear down this threestory office and expand the existing 293-space parking lot next to the building, adding another 418 spaces.

ly, sometimes ineffective and often contentious meetings.

America's greatest contribution to the running of orderly, effective meetings came at the hands, mind and pen of Henry Martyn Robert, an engineer and Brigadier General in the US.

He was alarmed at the lack of uniform definition of what parliamentary law was and what might be correctly done by groups such as churches and social clubs that was defined as legitimate. Originally he conceived of a short publication but the 11<sup>th</sup> edition tops 700 pages.

Speaking the Language

<u>Making a Motion</u> - A motion is the way that business is brought before any meeting body. It is normally done by rising, getting the attention of the chair/presider and saying "I move that..." Motions must have a second indicating to the presider that the body is interested in considering it. It may be debated (sometimes with time limits and order rules as to how many and what order the pro and con sides can speak).

Debate is closed either by running out of time, speakers or patience – often by "calling the question", leading to a 2/3s vote, stopping the discussion. Once the debate is closed, the presider calls for a vote, normally by voice or, if that is indecisive, by standing. A simple majority is required most commonly but motions do fall into classes and some require 2/3 of the body.

Amendments (Friendly and Otherwise) - Amendments to a motion can always be offered. Sometimes they are phrased as "friendly" because the motion maker and the amender agree it is necessary or an improvement.

But while people often think it is simple enough to ask the maker of the motion if they accept the change, it is not proper procedure. It should be voted on by the body, like any other amendment would be.

The only friendly amendment is the change suggested to the maker **before** the motion is placed and then it is included in the motion before it is made. So there are no friendly amendments - only motions that need a vote!



# Remember to Vote! 2013 is a Virginia Election Year



The State General Election for Virginia will be held on November 5, 2013. This fall we are voting for Governor, Lt. Governor and Attorney General as well as local district candidates for the state legislature. There may be other local issues such as bonds.

Most of us who live in Pimmit Hills vote at the Pimmit Hills Alternative High School at 7510 Lisle Ave in the Senior Center Area. The polls open at 6:00 am and close at 7:00 pm.

If you are not registered to vote, you must do so by October 15 to vote in this election. See the box to the right for details on how to register to vote. Going to be away on November 5? Download an absentee ballot application at the same site as the voter registration form or call 703-324-4735 and have one sent to you. Once you complete it, mail it to the Electoral Board address shown in the box with voter registration details as soon as possible.

As long as it is received by 5:00 pm of the Tuesday prior to the Election Day, you will get a mail ballot. That mail ballot has to be completed and in the hands of the elections office by the day of the election. You can also vote Absentee In Person at the local elections office up through the Saturday before November 5.

What about ID? You are required to have some form of identification at the polls (and for in-person absentee). It can be any of the following:

Virginia voter registration card; Valid Virginia driver's license; Military ID; Any Federal, Virginia state or local government-issued ID; Employer issued photo ID card; Concealed handgun permit; Valid student ID issued by any institution of higher education located in the Commonwealth of Virginia; Current utility bill, bank statement, government check or paycheck indicating the name and address of the voter; For a state election, your Social Security card.

Voting- Machine or Paper? Fairfax County is moving toward an all paper voting system. Why you may ask? Two reasons - it is actually quicker to mark the paper ballots in most instances, and most importantly, because having paper ballots allows the county to be able to recount if needed.

Information about the election issues from nonpartisan sources: The League of Women Voters in Virginia will offer information about candidates and their backgrounds. The newspapers often run candidate questions
